

Reports

President's Report - Erin MacKenney:

Throughout the continued challenge brought about by lockdowns, remote work, and the inability to gather, the staff continued to work with impressive dedication and commitment to support the mission and vision of the organization while always keeping the Littles at the center of their work. As an organization we rely heavily on the commitment of volunteers, I am grateful for the dedication of these individuals who have given their time and energy to our community's young people. The role of a mentor in a child's life is to create a safe space for them to grow, explore, and be themselves. I am grateful to our Board of Directors whose commitment and passion for the organization never ceases to amaze me. As I look forward to next year, I know that the road will not be smooth. We have much work to do and I am eternally thankful for Laurie and the entire team who, even in the face of uncertainty, always put the needs of our community's young people first. We will continue to work toward realizing the organization's mission of helping young people to ignite their power and potential by building strong and healthy Developmental Relationships.



Executive Director's Report - Laurie Collins:

Throughout 2021 our focus continued to revolve around our core values of enhancing the healthy development of young people through consistent Developmental Relationships, collaborating with others to promote healthy and safe environments for young people, staff and volunteers working together to maintain the highest standards to ensure positive outcomes, and striving to reflect the diversity of the communities we serve.

Our service delivery work locally is strongly aligned with work at the national level in bringing the new Theory of Change to life. Strategic partnerships were initiated to improve program evaluation capacity and to improve delivery of services; staff continued to play an active role in national committees and projects to contribute to new standards development and learn about new and emerging practices; volunteer mentors and board members worked tirelessly to ensure we are meeting the growing needs of our young people; and work has continued to broaden our reach into communities we have not effectively served in past years.

Thank you to the board members who are leaving at this time; Debbie Cooper, Paige Scott, and Harrison Teed, and also Matt Wegener, who left the board earlier this year.

To the staff, thank you for your outstanding dedication to service delivery. To program volunteers, thank you for helping young people on their journey of becoming the best version of themselves. To our community of supporters, thank you for believing in our mission of igniting the power and potential of young people through mentoring.



Finance Committee Report:

As expected during the second year of a pandemic, total revenue for 2021 saw another substantial decrease of \$42,935 compared to 2020 for an annual total of \$413,199. Thanks to the Federal supports including the CEWS, CERS and CEBA programs, we were able to recognize \$129,901 in much-needed revenue in 2021. However, it was not enough to offset the impact COVID-19 has had on Bowl for Kids' Sake, donations, and other fundraising event revenues. The agency had a deficit of \$28,463 this year; compared to a surplus of \$35,447 for 2020. The agency once again appreciated the support of the Provincial Government, the United Way Saint John, Kings & Charlotte and our community and corporate sponsors in Saint John, Kings and Charlotte counties.

On the expense side, total expenditures increased by \$20,975 to a total of \$441,662 for 2021, predominantly as a result of modest salary increases, employment grants and the planned addition of a Mentoring Facilitator position. On behalf of the Board, we are extremely proud of our staff and volunteers for continuing to adapt program offerings while maintaining the highest quality in yet another challenging year. Going forward, we will continue to strive to diversify revenue streams while continuing to keep non-program specific expenses low, with a focus on long-term sustainability. We remain committed to our vision of ensuring that all young people have opportunity to realize their full potential with the support of a mentor in their lives.



Program Impact Stories

In-School Mentor C & Mentee D met in November 2020 during the pandemic, meeting outside enjoying getting to know each other through playground time & playing picnic table cards/board games. Restrictions grew, moving them to virtual meetings & continuing to positively build their connection via TEAMS playing cards, crafts & charades. Once restrictions eased they started an anime costume. Although D always felt his interests were different than many his age, he felt comfortable sharing with Mentor C who encouraged his uniqueness. They eagerly learned about this by researching & D even learned to sew. 14 months later, through lockdowns & a school strike, they finished while all along talking about fears & dreams. D felt valued saying "C never judged my idea & was as into it as I was! I felt respected & she encouraged my idea. We laughed lots doing this & realized maybe we're not costume designers after all. C helped me bring my idea to life saying it was "an example that no dream is too big!" — In-Person In-School Mentoring Program

Mentor and mentee have been matched since November 2021. Their mentoring relationship got off to a slow start due to COVID—19, a strike, an extended Christmas break and then almost a month of online learning. In the beginning, the match definitely required added support as the mentee is very shy and quiet. The mentor is very friendly and chatty, with a strong desire to get to know her mentee and therefore was very open and willing to try new things to help break the ice. Although the mentee is quiet, it's very apparent that she's very interested and excited to have this mentoring relationship. Through more consistent weekly mentoring meetings, I saw a big shift in the mentee's comfort level and she has really opened up, requiring little to no support. They have more flow in their conversation, are eager to try new things together and are very complementary to each other. They have a list of things they'd like to do during their mentoring time, and both look forward to the week ahead. — Virtual In-School Mentoring Program

Deb & Kellan, matched 5-yrs ago as an in-school mentoring match, switched to community-based when Kellan went to middle school 2-yrs later. Kellan shares "I was a very quiet kid in grade 2 & Deb helped me to speak more." Deb agrees Kellan "has prospered into a communicative, funny, kind, caring, energetic 11-year old willing to try just about anything. It has been magical seeing change from the timid, shy, soft-spoken child to the confident, creative, self-expressive pre-teen with abilities constantly evolving." Kellan's mom shared "When matched, we knew it was perfect as they are 2 peas in a pod. Deb is so open to listening & giving Kellan a voice that Kellan has gone from a very quiet, shy girl to a confident young woman, comfortable saying what she wants & needs." Kellan has developed a keen sense of giving & volunteering through Deb's influence and Kellan feels that Deb will always be in her life in some capacity, although she already understands that it may change over time. — **Community Based Mentoring Program**

Program Impact Stories

The 2021 Mentor Links program began virtually with an online art lesson! We were joined by two of our Littles from Sussex, who we were very excited to be introduced to other group participants. In February, we held two outdoor events - a moonlight snowshoeing hike in Rockwood Park, and an ice fishing lesson (some of the kids got to take home the fresh smelt they caught!). In March, we tried an indoor, masked & socially-distanced event, hosted by our guests from River Valley Ground Search & Rescue, who presented the "Hug-a-Tree" wilderness safety program. We could tell the kids were not enjoying having to stay six feet apart from their friends, so as the Covid-19 variants increased in prevalence, the tough decision was made to put a hold on our Mentor Links group. We were hoping that we could return to programming in 2022, but after vaccine mandates limited who could attend, and with the increased pressure on the healthcare system from rising Covid cases, we decided to extend the break until it felt safer to continue. We appreciate the patience shown by our volunteers & families, and we are looking forward to seeing our youth again!
